
THE HEADS LIGHT UI

Commander Ashbolt's address strikes a chord

Under clear skies Heads residents filled Memorial Park for a ceremony that felt both calm and attentive. Guest speaker, Commander Daniel Ashbolt, delivered his address, and it was very well received by the large crowd. His words moved easily between history and the present day, reminding us that we pause each year not to dwell on old battles, but to recognise the cost of peace.

He spoke about the burden carried by a small nation: heavy losses, deep scars, and the simple truth that one in five who served did not return. Many who did return lived with injuries no doctor could mend. COMMUNITY FORUM

Councillor Reports Councillor Selena Clancy

• The Coastal Management Plan (CMP) and Entrance Management Policy (EMP) have now been adopted by Council.

- Shoalhaven Heads Pool: Opening is delayed by four weeks to 29 November, matching Milton Pool. The previous council set these dates to reduce costs. Selena pushed to bring the opening forward but only gained support from Clr Cox. Council advised that operating for the extra four weeks would cost around \$13,000. There is still no closing date listed on the website, which she believes is not acceptable. Council will not permit volunteer lifeguards. Selena will look into lowering the season pass price and seek an extra two weeks of operation at the end of the season. We were assured this shortened opening period won't be repeated next summer.
- The damaged river path beside the pontoon is unsafe and will be repaired by the end of the year, ready for the new playground opening.
- Post Office: A petition led by the Lions Club asks Australia Post to restore a service to the village. It will be coordinated through Fiona Phillips' office. Selena supports the community and noted that Bega achieved success with a new business model.
- **Q:** Are Boat Ramp repairs still funded? **A:** Yes. Funding is included within the Lower Shoalhaven River Coastal Management Program.
- Q: Will the Information Hub at the Community Centre continue? A: Yes. The contract renewal should be finalised soon.

Mayor Patricia White

- Shoalhaven Heads Pool: The reduced season was decided in the last council term. The CEO implemented operational cuts across both libraries and pools. Selena intends to move a motion requesting a detailed cost breakdown of all pools.
- New Code of Meeting Practice: Effective 1 January 2026, this will alter the way meetings operate. Council briefings will cease, and deputations will be presented at Public Forums. Monthly meetings will be held on the last Tuesday, with Forums held the week prior. Business papers will be issued 10–12 days beforehand.
- New Code of Conduct: Stronger mayoral powers will apply, operating in a way similar to parliamentary procedures. Councillors are expected to attend all meetings unless exceptional circumstances arise.
- **Tobacco Shops:** Sanctuary Point has three shops, one of which was recently vandalised. Nowra has nine and Ulladulla five.
- Waste Bins: A new \$37 million machine at West Nowra will soon process yellow bins, with 94% recycled and the remainder going to landfill. By 2030 all households will have both a green waste and a FOGO bin. Changes will begin appearing next year. Weekly green bin collection is planned, and the voucher system is under review. By 1 January 2028, businesses must separate waste or face fines.
- Safe Work Orders: Since 1 October 2025, Council has been covered by the Industrial Relations Act.
- Finances: The 2024/25 accounts were audited and approved by Auditor-General. Debt has reduced from \$192M to \$151M. Staff numbers have fallen by around 50 positions, mostly through natural attrition, and the restructure has reduced Director roles and fleet costs.
- **Tip Fees:** Council continues to be charged the higher metropolitan rate under State legislation. Despite questioning this several times, no change has been achieved.

Drainage - Bolong Rd Quarry / Fig Tree

Council has confirmed the drainage issue will be addressed. An initial study recommended a culvert through the driveway near the fig trees, but that solution did not fully resolve the problem. A new investigation has begun with the Northern District Drainage and Structures team. A detailed survey has been completed, and Council now plans to construct channels to disperse and redirect water more effectively, preventing it from collecting on the road.

Men's Shed / The Shed - Daf Hewson

Daf is the new president. Membership has grown from 12 to 42 since July 2025. New activities such as mosaics, vinyl cutting and other craft options are now available, and new members are always welcome. A regular newsletter is being produced and can be provided to anyone interested.

Surf Club - Nicky Pryde

There are 71 nippers this year. The club has received a new Inflatable Rescue Boat through an Ampol grant. Council is finalising the new holiday lifeguard contract. Bronze Medallion courses will be starting soon.

Lions Club - Rob Russell

The Lions Club is coordinating the petition to save the Post Office, with copies available at the Newsagent and online. Signatures are being collected to support a request to our Federal Member for Australia Post to restore a service to the village.

The Christmas raffle is being sold around town. The Bunnings BBQ will be held on 7 December. Christmas cakes are available at the newsagent.

The Lions have donated \$300 towards village Christmas decorations, and there will be prizes for Christmas lights this year.

Meals on Wheels - Cathy Law

The team is pleased with the new kitchen, which can now produce double the number of meals. More delivery drivers are needed, with the time commitment being around two hours per month. A picnic in the park is being planned with the Pre-school.

Community Centre - Jenny Edwards

- A new heavy-duty curtain track will be installed in the Banksia Room in the coming weeks.
- 88 Dream Cleaning has been booked to clean ceiling fans, the main corridor, the parquetry floor, and to gurney the concrete outside the hall.
- The Banksia Room carpet was recently steam cleaned and is looking much better.

CMP and EMP - Robyn Flack

Robyn reported that the Lower Shoalhaven River Coastal Management Program and the Entrance Management Policy have both been adopted by Council.

- She is hopeful the EMP will lead to improved outcomes during flood events. The team worked closely with Council flood engineer Mark Stone and believe the plan provides better flexibility, though the consultant's modelling only covered major floods rather than minor ones.
- There is disappointment that the adopted CMP does not reflect many community submissions. The coastal wetland was not recognised, and there is no allowance for sand scraping or dredging. The removal of the living shoreline project avoids a high-cost, high-maintenance proposal that would have limited public access to shallow water at River Road Reserve. Council will seek a permit to maintain the small mangrove-free area.

Explorer Boulevard Traffic Hazard - Gidg Zealand

Gidg raised concerns about traffic and parking hazards at the Explorer Boulevard and Scott Street intersection during Oz Tag and other sporting events. The forum will write to Council requesting "no parking" restrictions on the corner.

Gerroa Road & Beach Road Intersection - Cathy Law

Cathy noted a painted 100 km/h sign on the road surface near the intersection that conflicted with posted speed signs. Transport NSW has now been informed.

Footpaths - Bethany Sheehan

Bethany is keen to explore options for more footpaths in the village to improve safety, particularly for children, and to provide better connections to the primary school.

E-BIKE AND SCOOTER SAFETY



bikes, it's worth checking the rules and making sure the basics are followed: helmets on, safe speeds, and equipment that's legal for public paths and roads. A little caution goes a long way in keeping everyone safe.

SOUTHERN LIGHTS OVER SHOALHAVEN HEADS

On 12 November, the southern lights (Aurora Australis) made a rare appearance over Shoalhaven Heads. Usually, people travel to the other side of the world to see this kind of display, yet the sky lit up enough for us to catch it from the beach right here at home.

The ABC mentioned earlier that night that the lights would peak around 11pm, so we headed down for a look. It was a chilly night, and we only had my old iPhone with me, but it still managed to pick up the reds and yellows drifting across the horizon — far clearer than what the eye could see on its own.

Auroras form when charged particles from the Sun

collide with gases high in the atmosphere, creating colour bands that usually stay close to the poles. Strong solar activity pushed this one far enough north for us to see it along the coast.



Standing on the sand at five to eleven and watching the colours reflect off the water was something I never expected to witness in Shoalhaven Heads. It was quite a moment.

HEADS RURAL FIRE BRIGADE

Large Air Tanker at Coastal Waters

Hi Everybody. We've had 21 incidents since our last been anticipated. Residents had earlier been Report. Yes, 21!

Undoubtedly the biggest job was in Jervis Bay

It's early Sunday afternoon and my wife, Debra receives a call to attend the Shoalhaven Fire Control Centre as a developing incident was underway. A fire, fanned by a westerly breeze, had started in the Jervis Bay area.

Deb is a volunteer with the Shoalhaven Communications Brigade and one of their roles is to relay messages between Duty Officers or Incident Controllers and the Fire Crews on the ground, or in the air.

Initially local Brigades were employed to fight the fire but it soon became apparent that more units were required. SHRFB was called to assist with our Cat1 and we were assigned "Property Protection" at Coastal Waters, a retirement village.

Two Strike Teams comprising of 5 appliances each, from the Illawarra/Sutherland District were added to the call. Two water bombing Helicopters, the Large Air Tanker (LAT) and Spotter aircraft also attended.

The fire had split and whilst generally moving in an easterly direction, the fire direction became northerly as the terrain changed, threatening the village as had



advised to leave their homes but now the instruction was to stay indoors.

Fire crews to the west of us fought the fire head on as we waited for the fire to reach our sector. The vegetation prevented access to the fire and windblown ember attack on the village was a concern.

The LAT made its second and final "run" for the day at 5:45pm. It laid a line of Retardant between nearby houses and the fire. It was good we received prior warning and moved our appliance; otherwise the resulting pink colour scheme would have been hard to explain back at the station.

The strike teams set up a back burn to control fuel to the north.

The retardant worked. We remained on site ensuring all remained calm with an expected Southerly wind expected before midnight.

A total of more than 2500 firefighter hours over two days were spent controlling the fire. That does not include the mop up and "dangerous tree" recovery that



Beach Rd Car fire

Earlier in the month a car fire on Beach Road just prior to 9:00pm. With some of our new members on board, all three appliances from our station attended.

Willow Vale Grass fire

A week later and a grass fire beside the highway near Willow Vale was called in and both our tankers and Gerringong RFB attended. Defensive positions were taken as a nearby property was under threat.

Santa's Coming to Town

We'll be out with Santa Claus on 24th December during his annual reconnoitre of Shoalhaven Heads. The map will indicate when we might be in your area.

On behalf of SHRFB, we wish you a very enjoyable holiday period and a safe and prosperous 2026.

WHY ELECTRICITY PRICES ARE RISING - AND WHAT THE EVIDENCE ACTUALLY SHOWS

What's been driving bills up

People often wonder why power bills keep climbing when more solar and wind are being built. According to the Australian Energy Market Operator (AEMO) and the ACCC, the biggest price pressures have come from high coal and gas costs and from breakdowns at ageing coal stations.

AEMO's quarterly reports show that wholesale prices spiked in 2022 when global gas prices surged after Russia's invasion of Ukraine. Even though gas supplies only part of our electricity, gas-fired plants set the market price during tight periods, so our bills rose. At the same time, AEMO recorded more unplanned outages at older coal plants, which pushed prices higher again when units suddenly went offline. These factors flowed through to households long before most modern renewable projects were connected.

What renewables actually do to prices

CSIRO and AEMO both report that solar and wind are now the lowest-cost new sources of electricity in Australia. Because they have no fuel cost, they sell power into the market at very low prices. AEMO calls this the "merit-order effect": when solar or wind output is high, they push expensive generators further up

the bid stack, which lowers the marketclearing price.

The Australian Energy Regulator's annual reviews show this clearly. States with more renewables generally see lower average wholesale prices over the year. South Australia — with some of the highest renewable shares in the country — has often recorded the lowest or near-lowest prices. Regions that rely more on coal and gas have seen larger spikes, especially when fuel markets tighten or older units fail.


Why the transition feels bumpy

The ACCC has noted that years of slow investment in replacement generation left the system tight. As coal stations near

retirement, the grid is in a catch-up phase: old units are less reliable, while new infrastructure is still being built. This adds cost, but it is temporary.

Why cutting emissions quickly still matters

The Bureau of Meteorology reports that Australia has already warmed about 1.5°C. Each step of warming increases the intensity of heatwaves, bushfire danger,



heavy rain and coastal flooding. These risks carry real costs — from insurance premiums to disaster recovery.


Replacing ageing fossil-fuel generators with cleaner, modern power reduces both emissions and long-term energy prices. The evidence from AEMO, the ACCC, CSIRO and the Bureau of Meteorology all points in the same direction: the quickest path to stable, affordable electricity is to finish the transition, not to slow it.

TIME TO THROW CHICKEN ON THE BARBIE

It might sound like sacrilege, but I'm always keen to try variations on steak and snags at a barbie.

So when I saw this one from Adam Liaw recently we raided the pantry and the parsley patch and fired up the barbecue to try it out.

While at first blush this might seem a touch too much trouble for a barbecue, it really is pretty simple with a little preparation.

All the ingredients can be prepared ahead of time and it only requires six or seven minutes on the hotplate to cook.

And when you present the plate of perfectly cooked chicken redolent with those classic Greek flavours of garlic, oregano and lemon, you'll have a winner, chicken dinner.

Ingredients

- 1 tsp dried Greek oregano Chicken with Greek yoghurt
- 6 chicken thigh fillets
- salt and black pepper, to season
- ½ tsp turmeric powder
- 1 lemon: zested and juiced
- 4 garlic cloves, minced
- 1¼ cups thick yoghurt
- 1 tbsp olive oil, plus extra to drizzle
- ¼ tsp honey
- 1 tbsp finely shredded parsley

Method

Season the chicken thighs in a large bowl and season with salt and pepper, then mix with the turmeric, lem-

on juice, the garlic, half the oregano, ¼ cup of yoghurt and 1 tablespoon of olive oil. Set aside to marinade for 30 minutes

Combine the remaining yoghurt with the lemon zest, honey and parsley, and season well with salt and pepper.

Heat a barbecue grill over high heat and grill the chicken for about 3 minutes a side until cooked through. Rest well.

Spread the yoghurt mix on a serving plate and place the chicken on top. Scatter with the remaining oregano, drizzle with a little olive oil, season one last time with salt and pepper, then serve.

Belgium: Noel Ales are legendary - complex, fruity, spicy and yeast driven

USA: Spiced winter warmers - festive baked spice approach with additions such as chocolate, coffee, cherries or barrel aging.

Germany: Weihnachtsbier stronger versions of Bocks or Dunkels, celebrating malt richness

UK: Strong Ales and Old Ales - Toffee, dried fruit and subtle earthy hops that are sometimes reminiscent Christmas pudding.

WILDLIFE MATTERS - SING US A SONG MAGGIE

You've got to love the warble of the Australian Magpie, a songbird with a variety of complex calls.

They can mimic over 35 native and introduced bird species, dogs and horses, human speech and they were heard mimicking sirens during the Black Summer Bush Fires.

Magpies can sing for up to 70 minutes and they warble more often at the end of the breeding season.

Pairs of Maggies call to each other in a song known as "Carolling" to advertise and defend their territory. The sound they make is at a higher pitch than their usual warbles.

When the choir begins, they tilt their heads back, expand their chests and place wings backward.

As with all children, fledglings and juvenile Magpies emit high-pitched begging calls.

When alone, Magpies tend to make quiet, musical warbling which is melodious, but not carried for a long distance. I suppose this is a little like talking to oneself.

At the sight of a raptor, Maggies transmit a rallying call which results in a coordinated attack on the predator.



The natural predators of Magpies are monitor lizards and barking owls. The Australian Raven will also take nestlings for food.

However, their deaths are also caused by electrocution on powerlines or poisoning from eating mice or rats which have been baited. If they survive all these dangers, they can live for 25 years.


